

PRESIDENT CARL RETURNS TO PARISH MINISTRY

Pittsburgh Theological Seminary president the Rev. Dr. William J. Carl III has accepted a new call as pastor of Independent Presbyterian Church in Birmingham, Ala. He will serve as the seventh pastor of the 2,300 member church. Carl begins fulltime in July and until then will preach one Sunday each month.

"I've seen myself at Pittsburgh Seminary as pastor to the community," Carl said. "A little over a year ago, as part of healthy succession planning having completed my goals, I sensed my call was coming to an end. Almost immediately I began to realize God was calling me back to the parish. It is this ongoing rhythm from classroom to sanctuary that has marked both my ministry and my life."

When introduced to the congregation, Carl said, "Together, with God's help, we will lead this church into a second century of service to this community and to the glory of God's kingdom throughout the world."
