SCRIPTURE

PSALM 130

1 Out of the depths I cry to you, O LORD.

Lord, hear my voice!
Let your ears be attentive
to the voice of my supplications!

3 If you, O LORD, should mark iniquities, Lord, who could stand?4 But there is forgiveness with you, so that you may be revered.
