OVERVIEW

Francis of Assisi (1181-1226) was not a Church Reformer, but he was a reformer of the Church. He held no high ecclesial office, but Church leaders of his day and ours alike continue to draw inspiration from his message. He wrote no sagacious theological treatises, but theologians down through the centuries have claimed to write in his spirit. He was not self-assuming, but the current pope chose to assume his name, and entitles some of his encyclicals from Francis's writings. Francis lived more than 800 years ago. Was he ahead of his time? He certainly seems to still be ahead of ours. Who was Francis of Assisi, what did he set into motion, and what does his message

still call us to address today?

INSTRUCTOR

Fr. Bernie Tickerhoof is a friar of the Third Order Regular of St. Francis. He is currently the director of ongoing formation for his religious community, and is a member of Franciscan Pathways, the community's retreat ministry. Fr. Bernie received his master of divinity from St. Francis Seminary, formerly in Loretto, Pa., in 1978, and a master of theology in spirituality and liturgy through the Jesuit School of Theology at Berkeley, Calif. (now part of Santa Clara University) in 1979. He received a doctor of ministry at Pittsburgh Theological Seminary in 2001. Fr. Bernie has also pursued graduate studies at the Franciscan Institute at St. Bonaventure University and at the Catholic University of America.

Fr. Bernie was ordained in 1978, and has been involved in spiritual ministry and retreat work since 1979. He is a founding member of the Vineyard Guild, an ecumenical organization dedicated to promoting spiritual leadership. He is also a member of Spiritual Directors International and has an active ministry in the spiritual direction of a number of individuals. Other interests include storytelling, social justice, ecumenism and inter-faith, and ecological concerns. He is the author of several books and articles on the spiritual life.
