INSTITUTIONAL SUMMARY

POSITION SUMMARY

Pittsburgh Theological Seminary invites applications for a tenure-track, open-rank position in New Testament, ideally to begin in the fall of 2024. The candidate selected for this position will be a scholar of recognized stature or demonstrable potential with a research specialization in the letters of Paul and/or other New Testament letters. The candidate should have expertise in both the careful exegesis of Paul's letters and/or other New Testament letters. Moreover, we seek a scholar-teacher who is dedicated to the church's life and work, and equipped to teach New Testament courses for students in preparation for Christian ministry in a variety of forms. We hope to find a scholar with interdisciplinary interests and skills who desires to work collegially in an intercultural and theologically-diverse learning environment.

ESSENTIAL RESPONSIBILITIES

- Teaching four courses per year (including core biblical studies courses and electives in the master's curriculum).
- Relevant research and scholarly activities.
- Advising and mentoring students.
- Offering meaningful service to the institution, the church, and the broader community, including participation in the worship life of the PTS community.
- Ideal candidates will also be eager to teach in the Doctor of Ministry (DMin) curriculum and advise DMin and Masters of Theological Studies thesis projects.



QUALIFICATIONS/REQUIREMENTS

Pittsburgh Seminary is a graduate school of the Presbyterian Church (USA) yet treasures the fact that its faculty, staff, and students are ecumenically and theologically diverse. We seek a candidate who exhibits a theological hospitality in their teaching and research, and who will work with faculty and staff as a member of a larger team dedicated to a shared mission. A demonstrated competency in online teaching and learning is also desirable. Women and candidates from underrepresented communities are especially encouraged to apply.

EDUCATION/TRAINING/EXPERIENCE

Candidates must have a terminal degree in the field of New Testament and have shown excellence or promise in teaching and research. The candidate will ordinarily have the degree in hand, but ABD close to completion will be considered. Ordination and pastoral experience is valued.
