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

During his time at SYI, he came to appreciate the complexities of biblical and theological issues, and his love for study began to emerge. The professors at PTS challenged him to think in many ways about each issue and to be comfortable living out faith within the tension of unanswered guestions. Now as a full-time M.Div. student at Pittsburgh Seminary, Brian's gifts for ministry have been tangibly recognized. He received the Seminary's highest merit award

for his academically excellent work. The funding gives Brian the support he needs to obtain a high-quality theological education without incurring overburdening financial debt.

Ebony Taylor, a master of arts student, has been serving as a social worker in the Woodland Hills School District for a decade. She is continuing to set an example for her children by following God's call, now also as an evening student at PTS. "Education and faith are extremely important to me, and I want to be a role model for my children in both areas of life," says Ebony. From a family of five generations of pastors, two years ago she felt God saying, "You're living a good life, Ebony, but not necessarily the one I intended." So she decided to "get on God's program." "I do a lot of informal counseling, and I want to continue to do that in a biblically well informed way," she notes.





A 2003 graduate of Singapore Bible College with an M.Div. degree, Calvin Chong has served as a Basel Christian Church of Malaysia pastor for more than a decade. Desiring to further his theological education, he enrolled in a master of theology program in his home state, at Malaysia's Sabah Theological Seminary. The principal of STS told Calvin of our international student scholarship, so Calvin applied to our STM program. Despite having just gotten married in June, he and his wife, Lu, decided Calvin should study in Pittsburgh this year, while Lu remained at her job in Malaysia. "It is because of the scholarship

that I could come," says Calvin. Along with taking classes, he is working on a thesis studying the use of the Old Testament in the New Testament.




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
