The Story of Our Worship Space

As part of an ongoing revitalization of worship life at PTS, Hicks Chapel has undergone significant changes over the past few years. The intimacy and flexibility of our renovated space now support the diversity and creativity of worship planning and leadership that we encourage through our chapel program.

The process began in the summer of 2012. We first removed the pews of the lower part of the sanctuary and replaced them with chairs. We then installed carpeting and repainted the walls, contributing to the space a sense of warmth that was previously lacking. Finally, we ordered a liturgical suite made by Erich Thompson. Rev. Thompson is a Presbyterian minister who has found a calling in the design and construction of liturgical furnishings. You can read more about his work at www.erichthompson.net.

The sanctuary's "default" set-up embodies a theological understanding of God's church. Upon entering the sanctuary, worshipers are immediately greeted by the Baptismal font as a reminder that we do not enter God's presence on our own accord, but because God reached out to us in the covenant of baptism. The chairs are arranged in a circle, creating an intimate atmosphere that allows us to integrate worship leaders, musicians, and choirs into one community. It is from this community that God calls upon members to proclaim His Word. Therefore, the pulpit is placed as a part of the community circle. The pulpit is "flexible," but not "multi-functional" – it can be moved, but not because it is merely a lectern. When we preach, we speak not in our own name, but in the name of the Lord. To symbolize this, our pulpit reflects the shape of a traditional pulpit in which the preacher, as it were, disappears into the structure that surrounds. In this way, the worshiping community's focus is directed toward the Word, rather than the speaker.

At the center of the sanctuary is a large, square communion table. It is supported by three legs on each of its four sides. According to the designer, this four times three scheme aims to remind us of the Trinity, the four Gospels, and the twelve Disciples. Additionally, the face of each side shows the Hebrew symbol *shin* – standing for *shalom*, *Shaddai*, and *shakina*. It is around this table – the Lord's Table – that the community gathers. Because the table is square, there is no definitive "head." This reminds worshipers that in our celebration of the Lord's Supper, it is not the presider who is the host, but Christ himself.
