COURSE DESCRIPTION:

An introduction to John Calvin's thought in the context of his career as a reformer, with attention to the intellectual background and socio-political realities that shaped his theology. The course will highlight Calvin's lived experience as a religious refugee whose theology was especially sensitive to the needs of fellow exiles. <u>This course fulfills the Historical Context Elective (HCE) requirement for M.Div.</u> <u>Students</u>.

CLASS OBJECTIVES:

- 1. Read a diverse selection of Calvin's writings.
- 2. Gain an overarching sense of Calvin's thought and his views on a variety of topics.
- 3. Place Calvin's writings in their particular historical context and relation to other reformers, with attention to the development of Calvin's theological positions over time.
- 4. Become more responsible in our use of historical sources in contemporary theology.
- 5. Read supplemental secondary readings to gain a sense of current Calvin scholarship.
- 6. Arrive at basic conclusions about Calvin's relationship to the broader Reformed tradition.
