COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course completes the study of introductory Greek grammar, extends vocabulary memorization, and introduces the practice of exegesis. Students will gain skills in interpreting texts by giving attention to their literary, social, historical, and canonical contexts, and by articulating the meaning of these texts as Christian Scripture. Students will also learn to identify appropriate scholarly resources for biblical interpretation.

CLASS OBJECTIVES:

- a) to master the remaining Greek vocabulary and grammar in Baugh, *A Primer of New Testament Greek*;
- b) to translate exercises in Baugh's *Primer* with confidence;
- c) to introduce and explore various approaches to reading New Testament texts as Christian Scripture;
- d) to acquaint students with important resources for NT exegesis.

PREREQUISITES: NT210

REQUIRED TEXTBOOKS/READING:

Required: Baugh, S. M. *A New Testament Greek Primer*. 3rd edition. Phillipsburg: P & R Publishing, 2012, ISBN: 978-1596386464, \$22.99. (NOTE: do not purchase a used *Primer* that has markings in the exercises.)
