COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course introduces students to the basics of biblical Hebrew and to the tools necessary for translating and interpreting Hebrew texts. Students will learn Hebrew consonants and vowel points and the rudiments of grammar and syntax. They will learn basic vocabulary and begin to translate and interpret simple sentences from the Hebrew Bible.

CLASS OBJECTIVES:

- (a) Give a primary meaning for all vocabulary listed in the grammar (OT03 will cover approximately chapters 1-20);
- (b) Use the <u>New Brown-Driver-Briggs Hebrew and English Lexicon</u> as a resource for studying biblical texts;
- (c) Translate simple Hebrew prose sentences;
- (d) Evaluate in grammatical and syntactical terms the elements of simple Hebrew narrative.
