


2014 SUMMER LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE

Founder and president of the Evangelical Association for the Promotion of Education (EAPE), Dr. Campolo has worked to create, nurture, and support programs for "at-risk" children in cities across North America, and has helped establish schools and universities in several developing countries. Dr. Campolo is one of the founders of the Red Letter Christian movement and blogs regularly on its website. He is a media commentator on religious, social, and

political matters and an ordained minister, having served American Baptist Churches in New Jersey and Pennsylvania. Campolo is an associate pastor at the Mount Carmel Baptist Church in West Philadelphia.

ANGELA DIENHART HANCOCK serves as assistant professor of homiletics and worship at Pittsburgh Theological Seminary. Before coming to PTS, Hancock taught at Princeton Theological Seminary, The Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia, and the Lutheran Seminary at Gettysburg. She is an ordained Minister of Word and Sacrament in the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) and has served as pastor to churches in Pennsylvania, Kentucky, and Tennessee. Hancock earned her bachelor's in music from Indiana University, Bloomington and her M.Div. and Ph.D. from Princeton Theological Seminary, where she won prizes in preaching and church music. She is the author of Karl Barth's Emergency Homiletic, 1932-33: A Summons to Prophetic Witness at the Dawn of the Third Reich, a contextual interpretation of Barth's lectures on preaching in the early 1930s based on unpublished archival material.

SUMMER LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE

In 1942 Dr. Hugh Thomson Kerr, pastor of The Shadyside Presbyterian Church, and Elder James C. Rea conceived the idea of providing a low-cost residential program of lectures, workshops, worship services, relaxation, and fellowship for Presbyterian pastors of small churches in the Pittsburgh area. Since then, the invitation to participate has expanded; first to include the Synod of the Trinity and five neighboring presbyteries, then to ministers in other denominations and in other presbyteries, and now to educators, leaders, and laypersons in local congregations.

TUESDAY PRESENTERS

HELEN BLIER, Director of Continuing Education, PTS

"Who do you say that I am?' Educating for Chrstian Imagination"

Jesus asked his disciples this question...after asking them, "Who do others say that I am?" Christian education is about teaching to both question who others have claimed Christ to be and helping participants come to know him for themselves. We will explore how this education has taken place throughout two millennia and invite participants to imagine anew what it might look like today.

LEANNA FULLER, Assistant Professor of Pastoral Care, PTS "Christian Conflict: Oxymoron or Opportunity?"

Many Christians see conflict as something that should be avoided in personal relationships and faith communities. This workshop will present a different way of understanding conflict: namely, as a normal part of human relationship and as a natural result of the diversity inherent in creation. We will discuss how Christian values can inform healthier models of conflict as well as strategies for introducing such models into their own ministry contexts.

JOHANNES SWART, Associate Professor of World Mission and Evangelism, PTS "No Mission, No Identity"

Companionship – breaking bread together – is at the heart of a missional understanding of Christian identity. And according to Sri Lankan evangelist D.T. Niles, we are all "beggars telling other beggars where to find bread." This workshop will explore the dynamics of Christian identity as a people sent by God into companionship with others.

LISA THOMPSON, Assistant Professor of Homiletics, PTS

"Preaching at the Intersections"

Preachers have the task of making faithful proclamation in particular contexts. Christian identity informs the interpretive decisions we make for preaching. This sense of identity is multifaceted and informed by personal and communal narratives. We will explore faithful proclamation at the intersections of self-identity, cultural contexts, and scripture.

STEVEN TUELL, James A, Kelso Professor of Hebrew and Old Testament, PTS "'I Am No Prophet': Christian Identity and the Loss of Self"

The prophets of ancient Israel did not choose to become prophets; instead, they responded to their calls with resistance. Jeremiah wished he could not speak in the Lord's name. Amos denied that he WAS a prophet. What if our identity is not a matter of our choice, after all, but rather a recognition that God is God? What if we find ourselves, as Jesus said, only denying ourselves?

HEATHER VACEK, Assistant Professor of Church History, PTS "Christian Identity and American Religious History"

During this session, we will explore the lives of five different figures – a colonial era woman who led Bible studies in her home, a 19th century abolitionist, an early 20th century radio personality, and others. With their stories in mind, we will ask what is at stake in defining and claiming a Christian identity in 21st century America?



PAMELA ARMSTRONG, Employment and Education Supervisor, and KELLIE WILD, I.M.P.A.C.T.S. Program Director, East End Cooperative Ministries "Beyond the Walls of the Congregation"

Join us in practical discussion on how pastors can lead their congregations into engaging in genuine relationships that leave an impact upon the communities they serve. We will talk about preconceived ideas of ministry and how we should look as we minister.

CYNDI BLOISE, Pastor, Center Avenue United Methodist Church and Executive Director, Pitcairn/Allegheny Circles Initiative

"Circles: God's Mission to Love People in the Margins"

Circles USA is a national movement to eliminate poverty through intentional relationships between low-income people and middle- and upper-income "Allies." Its work focuses on individual choice and behavior and engaging the community to address barriers to moving out of poverty. We will discuss how this model of ministry can change and grow a church.

JENN FRAYER-GRIGGS, Table Minister, Hot Metal Bridge Faith Community "Feed My Sheep, Sheep"

Join us as we think and talk about Jesus' command to feed his sheep. Jenn will share what she has learned about how we are all sheep - we are all hungry for something, and, as we learn to be the hands and feet of Christ in feeding others, we find that we, too, are fed.

SCOTT FULLER, Chaplain, Personal Touch Hospice

"Jesus Wept: Being Present with Those Who Suffer"

In a culture where illness, death, and grief are often taboo topics, the church can offer the gift of ministry of presence in times of suffering. We will focus on the Incarnation as the basis for understanding Christian caregiving in contemporary contexts and explore how Christian spiritual care differs from the services offered by other institutions in times of crisis and pain.

DANA GOLD, Director of Programs, The Mentoring Partnership of SWPA "The Poverty Spiral: Decisions and Dilemmas"

Living in poverty brings with it limited choices and unlimited stress. Participants will gain new insight into the decisions and dilemmas poverty brings by joining in a simulation that is easily adapted for congregational use. Discussion will include a reflection on Dana's journey with the homeless, addicted, and orphaned while creating the Poverty Spiral.

ANNA HOLLIS, Executive Director, Amachi Pittsburgh

"Crime Does Pay....But For Whom?"

In Matthew 25, Jesus says that when we visit those in prison, "the least of these," that we did it to him. With 2 million+ adults behind bars, those who suffer most are the millions of innocent children left behind. Participants in this workshop will examine the harsh realities facing families who pay the real costs of incarceration and ways of breaking the generational cycle.

ERICA McILROY, Private Practice Attorney

"Welcoming the Stranger"

Scripture frequently urges us to show hospitality to the stranger. This workshop will explore what it means to minister to those foreign to our immediate culture and the issues this raises for work with immigrants and our own self-identity.
