*Call to Worship

Leader: We have come to the mountain.

We have come to find reconciliation and peace.

People: We peer over the mountain, to see the promise on the other side,

but there is still trouble in the land;

confusion is all around.

Leader: Our brothers and sisters are still dying:

church burnings remind us of days long past;

we are still torn apart by hatred.

People: We have come together to the mountain, seeking reconciliation and peace.

We peer over the mountain,

but there is trouble in the land.

Leader: Where we are torn and pulled apart by hate because of our race,

dishonored is your living face on earth, O God.

People: God, we bear the imprint of your face:

the colors of our skin are your design,

and what we have of beauty in our race as man or woman,


you alone define.

*Call to Confession

Leader: God is filled with grace and acceptance. God continues to redeem and heal. In this assurance, let us confess our sin before God and each other.

*Prayer of Confession

Leader: We confess, O God, that we have rejected members of your family.

People: We have neglected to speak up for justice.

Leader: We confess, O God, that we color you, gender you, and nationalize you.

People: We have behaved as if you belong solely to us,

refusing to recognize that you are the God of all.

Leader: We confess that we have participated in a flawed system,

one that privileges some and disadvantages others,

based on something as arbitrary as the color of one's skin, the texture of one's hair...

People: Forgive us for the things we have said,

and the things we have left unsaid.

Leader: Give us the strength to speak up for racial justice,

People: Forgive us for the things we have done,

and the things we have left undone.

Leader: Give us the strength to love the intercultural community of God,

People: Forgive us for our inaction,

based on our uncertainty in a course of action.

Leader: Lead us to a new beginning,

where love and faithfulness meet together,

People: where righteousness and peace will kiss each other.

*Assurance of Pardon and Freedom

Leader: If anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away;

see everything has become new. In the name of Jesus Christ, we are forgiven.

People: Thanks be to God! Amen.

*Passing of the Peace

Leader: The peace of Christ be with you all.

People: And also with you.

Readings

Love is creative and redemptive. Love builds up and unites; hate tears down and destroys. The aftermath of the 'fight with fire' method which you suggest is bitterness and chaos, the aftermath of the love method is reconciliation and creation of the beloved community. Physical force can repress, restrain, coerce, destroy, but it cannot create and organize anything permanent; only love can do that. Yes, love—which means understanding, creative, redemptive goodwill, even for one's enemies—is the solution to the race problem.

Prayer

People: We believe that God has entrusted the church with the message of reconciliation in and through Jesus Christ;

- that the church is called to be the salt of the earth and the light of the world, that the church is called blessed because it is a peacemaker, that the church is witness both by word and by deed to the new heaven and the new earth in which righteousness dwells.
- that God's lifegiving Word and Spirit have conquered the powers of sin and death, and therefore also of irreconciliation and hatred, bitterness and enmity, that God's lifegiving Word and Spirit will enable the church to live in a new obedience which can open new possibilities of life for society and the world;
- that the credibility of this message is seriously affected and its beneficial work obstructed
 when it is proclaimed in a land which professes to be Christian,
 but in which the enforced separation of people on a racial basis
 promotes and perpetuates alienation, hatred, and enmity;
- that any teaching which attempts to legitimate such forced separation by appeal to the gospel, and is not prepared to venture on the road of obedience and reconciliation, but rather, out of prejudice, fear, selfishness, and unbelief, denies in advance the reconciling power of the gospel, must be considered ideology and false doctrine.

Therefore, we reject any doctrine which,

in such a situation sanctions in the name of the gospel or of the will of God the forced separation of people on the grounds of race and color and thereby in advance obstructs and weakens the ministry and experience of reconciliation in Christ.

To the one and only God be the honor and the glory forever and ever. Amen.
